They will be going to the city for re-zoning on the new Acoma project. Plan is to rezone the property – from IA – to IMX3 or IMX5 where they would consolidate services into one building. Same # of beds (40 for the shelter). Add offices and affordable housing units.

Jim – 1980's King Soopers had a Chum program where through coupons donations were made. Might be something to consider doing again. Ray – where do the kids come from ? all over Colorado – majority from the metro area but since they are nationally known sometimes from other states. Since the Family crisis center has closed they receive many referrals from case managers. Mara – when go to council? Maggie – will get proposed calendar when we may need to provide level of support.

### Presentation by Chad Martinez (303-803-2442) <a href="mailto:coloradoblueline@gmail.com">coloradoblueline@gmail.com</a>

Chad approached the group to seek approval for a new business in our neighborhood planned to be a retro-themed video game lounge with cannabis consumption. Mid-sized establishment with retro and current consoles, serving pre-packaged food and beverages. Indoors, vape and edibles only. He provided a handout which explains the project including the safety and nuisance controls such as

- zero tolerance policy
- staff trained to detect and deal with impairment issues
- Quantity limitations
- Alternate transportation incentives
- Partnership with police and neighborhood

- Proper filtration and ventilation. NO outside consumption He opened it up for questions.

Kevin – location? – SW corner of Harvard and Broadway. about 2500 sq ft. Andrew – rules on Tobacco? – no usage – only cannabis vaping and edibles Christen – how to handle people coming from bars (alcohol)? – no dual consumption. They will look for signs and will turn away anyone they suspect has been drinking.

Sam – charge admission? – hourly rate, similar to internet cafes. Customers provide own cannabis, they provide vape equipment.

Terry – hours? 2pm – 2am.

Phylis – you are making money from renting the time to use the equipment and video games. Is this for the homeless? No, it is geared towards those people living in apartments where there may be restrictions for consuming. This provides a safe and legal place to consume.

Mara – timing? Asking for a non-objection letter from neighborhood by Mid-late September which is needed for permit approval. They hope to open in January.

Andrew made a motion to take a vote tonight for providing a non-objection letter from the neighborhood. Jolon explained to us that by not taking a vote, they would not be able to apply for application. By providing a non-objection letter, it would allow them to file for permit.

After short discussion, vote was taken where 12 members were for the motion and 1 member against.

A letter will be drafted and approved and provided to Chad.

### **Post Chicken and Beer Request**

Filed application to expand outdoor area which they have been sending to people in neighborhood. Asking for a letter from OPNA. Also, you can sign a petition at the restaurant.

Ray – moved that we wait until they appear before us. All agreed.

### Recap of Outside Lands Event

Amy, Rob, Mara, Andrew – visited Superfly's Outside Lands event to do some fact finding on how the festival is run behind the scenes and how it might translate over

to our own festival next year. Each person took a different topic and reported back with notes and pictures presented to the group. Here's a brief synopsis from their presentation. Please reach out to them with any additional questions you might have.

Rob – integrated art and culture – no evidence of tire tracks. Booths for each neighborhood showing something unique about each neighborhood. A lot of symbolism throughout the park including Ranger Dave, a popular Instagram spot. Whole community came together through music, comedy, farmer's market. They met with security and the neighborhood hotline including the neighborhood association president who has been there for 10 years. They are still involved and totally positive about the festival. In the first 5 years there was a debriefing with the neighborhood before and after each festival where improvements were discussed and implement in future years. All the people involved in Outside Lands are talking with people in Denver to share information on how to make this successful for everyone. Located in Golden Gate state park, on the polo fields and inside the botanic area of the park. Normal activities like roller skating rink continued outside the festival and in the park.

Amy – spoke of the planning of stages and how they were spacing them out and the timing of acts with the intention to spread out people, helping with the egress. There were stages of various sizes. Metallica and the Who, Smaller stages for local acts. More visibility. Accessibility – all stages had separate ADA access. Sound – biggest stage – walking behind the stage – did not hear anything. Only at about 45 degrees – started to hear the sound. Neighborhood – sound more ambient sound. Trash – Good signage for trash and recyclables. Volunteers and incentives with festival goers – pick up trash = free meal. Lockers. Diversity of the audience. Wide range of ages. A lot of babies and families.

Andrew – transportation – ingress and egress – dedicated crossing. Volunteers outside to direct people. Trash volunteers outside. Bike paths into the festival. Special parking tags. Fencing and crowd control - Bike valet – staffed. And also free bike parking. No full parking lots. Buses and Lyft and Uber, bikes and walking. Use of cameras to control the crowds. Wide and open paths, loops to slow down.

Mara – safety – command center – grid system broken up into 80 squares. Onsite medical staff – command chief – officer – plain clothes officer in each grid. A lot of fencing – 3 layers coming in. Wrist bands for festival goers allow access into different areas.

Judy – what to work on? They were concerned about the trash at night but found in the morning it was pristine. Cleaned up everything. In Denver usage of public transit will be very important.

- City council – completed the approval of projects for the upcoming GO Bond where the Jewell Pedestrian Bridge is included. Also 7 million dollars for Alameda underpass to include bike/ped/ADA improvements. Please vote!!

- Halloween parade – Oct 21<sup>st</sup>. Third Avenue to Alameda.

- Electric eTuks providing free shuttle service on Broadway between Alameda and Sixth Avenue on Thursdays from 6pm - 10:30pm. Check it out during this 13 week pilot.

- Gates redevelopment maybe will go to city council by end of year.

- Trash – currently Denver diverts 20% from landfill. The city of Loveland diverts 60% by having weekly recycling pickup and charging for the size of normal trash bins. The national average is 43%. The city of Denver could be doing better and the only way to flip the switch is to go to a different system. Need to make a choice as a community to promote more composting and recycling to keep more trash out of landfill. This is just an idea which should be discussed and considered in the future.
